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Why We Take Drugs Seeking

Drug addiction is a chronic disease characterized by drug seeking and use that is compulsive, or difficult to control, despite harmful consequences. Brain changes that occur over time with drug use challenge an addicted person's self-control and interfere with their ability to resist intense urges to take drugs.

Addiction is defined as a chronic, relapsing disorder characterized by compulsive drug seeking and use despite adverse consequences. † It is considered a brain disorder, because it involves functional changes to brain circuits involved in reward, stress, and self-control.

Drug use is voluntary behavior motivated by pleasure. The Lay or Moral Model of addiction takes a stern normative stance on the seeking of pleasure in this way – it regards it as parasitic, irresponsible, hedonism.

Pleasure and Addiction

One of the basic reasons a person becomes addicted to using drugs or drinking is that these reasons don't magically go away after a person uses drugs a few times. They may still lack the social skills to be comfortable around other people or may still suffer from stress and problems. They may still be bored or seeking ways to fit in.
